

Good Standing

What is Good Standing?

- **Good Standing** is achieved when an organization's grants are in compliance with all applicable grant administration guidelines (both Proposition A and Measure A grants).

Why is Good Standing important?

- Only organizations in Good Standing can apply for Measure A grants.
- Good Standing is required to have payment requests processed and reimbursement funds released.

How do I know if my organization is in Good Standing?

- Agencies without open grants with RPOSD are in Good Standing.
- Agencies with open grants that are in compliance with all RPOSD grant guidelines are in good standing.
- Good Standing applies to an organization, not individual grants. If an organization has one grant that is not in compliance, the resulting loss of Good Standing affects all open grants with RPOSD.

Agencies with RPOSD grants that are not in compliance with all applicable Grant Administration guidelines are not in Good Standing.

- Your Grant Officer will notify you if you are not in Good Standing
- The following issues will result in the loss of Good Standing:
 - Pattern of inadequate community engagement
 - Failure to:
 - complete the annual enrollment process
 - verify and/or update enrollment information every 12 months
 - sign and complete grant agreement within 16 days of receipt
 - apply for a grant agreement amendment if there are any changes to the grant budget, scope, name, or grant performance period
 - adhere to the grant scope, budget, & timeline as described in the grant agreement or amended grant agreement
 - close grant within grant performance end date
 - comply with long-term obligations
 - comply with grant conversion requirements
 - comply with accounting requirements
